



REMEMBERING **PAUL AND MARTHA PITMAN**

Our banquet this evening is named for two very special people without whose efforts we might not be here tonight honoring the academic achievements of Yosemite High School students.

The Pitmans, who were both educators in their 70's, came to Oakhurst to retire. That retirement would be short-lived. The Pitmans were a driving force behind the formation of Yosemite High School. Harry Baker, who was president of the Eastern Madera County Chamber of Commerce and a member of the Sierra High School Board at the time, stated that Paul Pitman had come to him and said, "I understand you're working for a new high school...is there anything I can do?" Baker said that the Pitmans became involved at a critical time in the high school effort. Martha Pitman was the chairman of the Citizen Committee and Paul M. Pitman was the education counselor for the five mountain elementary school districts. Dr. Pitman was appointed acting Superintendent for Yosemite High School until February 28, 1974.

Jean Gibson, who was also active in forming the high school district, said that every time they suffered a defeat or setback, Paul and Martha would take off for Sacramento. There they consulted with the State Department of Education, the Educational Codes, and the Legislature. "They were able to give us encouragement and a way to

proceed to form our own district”, Gibson said. “Our biggest crusher was when the Department of Education rejected the request for another high school. That’s when Martha Pitman left for Sacramento like it was in her own back yard!” At the time, Martha was also soliciting every club and civic organization in the area and she wrote a weekly column keeping everyone informed on the high school district “battle”. Together, the Pitmans managed to find an obscure way – by obtaining 33 percent of registered voters’ signatures in a petition – to get a hearing before the State Board of Education. On September 18, 1973, the vote was 1659 to 244 in favor of separation from the Sierra Joint Union School District and formation of a new district composed of students from the Oakhurst, Coarsegold, Raymond Knowles, Wasuma and Bass Lake Schools. “More than half the voters were retirees who had neither children nor grandchildren who would benefit by a high school and yet in March, 1974, over 88 percent of the registered voters voted for a combined bond and state loan of \$5,200,000!” commented Paul Pitman. Yosemite High School was no longer a dream, but would soon be a reality! The school opened its doors to approximately 450 students in September, 1976.

On June 13, 1986, the Yosemite High School Library was dedicated to Paul and Martha Pitman. We dedicate our banquet tonight to their memory.
